Who can look back to our early beginnings without amazement at where we are now & how all our paths have crossed. There we sat — Bob Pagnette (whose family dated to the French Marquis de Vaudrais (?) who was "Gov" of New Orleans before the LA Purchase & later head of Canada); Lois whose grandfather came across the Country on the old Oregon Trail to Brownsville Oregon, Virginia (Aren Dale (from midwest? to Scrappo to Dixie A+M to Italy — expert on Tag), Warren whose parents came from Chicago to LA/Santa Monica just before he was born & now he's traveled the world from Siam → Russia → Libya → wherever else — oh yes London — and me (with my next best) born in Germany in 1819

my mother from Kansas - came to CA 1901  
age 18, all alone. My father born  
San Luis Obispo his father born Ohio his gf.  
born Connecticut — a Civil War Union General

P.S. Virginia — because of all the pages I copied  
for you from our Arizona 1941 book I've spent my evenings  
since seeing you reading the book & bought at Zane Grey's  
cabin near PAYSON + The Mogollon Rim — The book is  
A Little Way of Our Own: The Pleasant Valley Trail Revisited by  
Don Dederer 1988 (Northland Printing, Flagstaff). Dederer  
was an editor of Arizona Highways. This book has great history of  
the cattle herds before surveying of boundaries, the Rustlers,  
the sheep " , the fends, the RR owning every other  
mile — The early wildness of Ariz. Is that what your  
Dad liked, settling there? Last night I read the facts of  
the Thirteenth Territorial Legislature which met in Prescott 1885,  
known as "the Bloody Thirteenth" because the lawmakers settled  
differences with fists + guns.

Also the author says historically roads went  
Through East to West (Apache, sheep, cattle drives,  
pioneers etc) but North ↔ South travel was difficult.

Five Pima County legislators for the 1885 meeting in Prescott  
each claimed \$330 in travel expenses @ 15¢ a mile —

To reach Prescott they travelled by TRAIN from  
Tucson (Pima Co) to Los Angeles, then Three Needles to  
Ash Fork Ariz where they caught the stage to Prescott!

I LOVE these old Tales — your  
Dad probably told you lots of early stories!
