Mrs. Bunn asked a blessing on "Mrs. Silver in all her interests upon Salem, her native city, which she loved and served so diligently, following the example set by a loyal ancestry."

Every one will agree that the object of a pep meeting is to work up enthusiasm for some event. The thing that we do not all agree upon is how this enthusiasm should be worked up. A good example of the wrong way to do it was evidenced at the rally held in the H. P. E. building before the Wesleyan game.

Out of fairness to Boost Wittenberg association, it should be stated that that organization had nothing whatsoever to do with the tactics of some of the speakers who could not refrain from drawing in personalities. In fact, that association went on record as being opposed to pep that was secured by slander and insults. We do not believe that attacking a problem from the negative side will achieve any lasting results. We can never have a unified student body so long as the men who happen to play in the band are insulted in order to glorify the football team. The man who plays in the band is giving just as much for the school as the man who plays football. Football players who have plaid instruments can verify that the drudgery of practice is present in music as it is in football.

Talent is a thing that we cannot govern. If we know how to play football and have the physical equipment our service to the college should be to play football. But if on the other hand, our place is in the band we are making the most of our talent if we play in the band. Each student who gives his best to the school is giving as much as any other member of the student body. The point is that each student should contribute *something*. It is the students who are the drones that should be criticized if any must be.

We did not think that good judgment was used when certain members of the faculty were condemned by the speakers. There is no doubt that the faculty has the interests of Wittenberg at heart as much if not more than any student in the school. It seemed to be such a useless thing to antagonize the professors in the name of spirit.

Students of Wittenberg, you can govern your own pep meetings. You can prevent any such thing as happened at the last one. You can see that fair play is administered to everyone. It is your duty to make it plain that you are not in favor of such tactics as were used. If you do not want them, they will not be used. You must see that pep is secured by positive attack rather than a negative attack. It rests entirely with you—it is your school.
