SELECTEE FOR NATIONAL YOUTH CONFERENCE

Miss Deborah Stanley (Debbie) was chosen as the Bluebonnet Girl Scout Council selectee for the National Youth Conference on Natural Beauty and Conservation, and her application has been sent to the Regional Selections Committee. One registration each from Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico will be chosen.

The Conference is a follow-up of the White House Conference on Natural Beauty. In May, 1965, Girl Scouts of the USA sent a wire to President and Mrs. Johnson expressing strong conviction about the importance of involving youth in program for the beautification of America, and suggesting the possibility of a meeting of adult representa-tives of national youth agencies. With Mrs. Johnson's enthusiastic concurrence, youth and adults of 10 youth agencies are being called for this National Youth Conference on Natural Beauty and Conservation, Washington, D.C., June 27-29. 500 youths from 50 states, one delegate per state from each of the co-operating agencies: Boy Scouts, Boys' Clubs, Camp Fire Girls, 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers of America, Girl Scouts, Girls Clubs of America, YMCA, YWCA, and especially invited youth not affiliated with the cooperating agencies. The majority of youth attending will be of the high school age.




