WHEREAS, Dr. Dale F. Leipper, requested and has been granted approval for reassignment from University Administration to full-time teaching and research effective March 1, 1964, Texas A&M University, although losing an efficient, capable and dedicated administrator is gaining a full-time teacher-researcher of the recognized international reputation, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Leipper during his fourteen years' tenure as the first Head of the Department of Oceanography and Meteorology has been instrumental in developing this department to one of the top five in the nation, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Leipper has brought the Department of Oceanography and Meteorology from less than five members to its present complement of some 100 full-time and 70 part-time employees, of which 71 are of the level of professional, technical or research personnel, and

WHEREAS, under Dr. Leipper's guidance the graduate program has developed steadily to the present number of over 80 students with the instructional programs unanimously regarded as being the best rounded in the nation, and

WHEREAS, the research program has grown and prospered under the direction of Dr. Leipper to its present annual volume of approximately \$2,000,000; the program involves operations in many locations such as Galveston, Dallas, and Panama City, Florida; the program involves the management and use of extensive facilities such as the research vessel Alaminos, the desalination pilot plant, the mobile micrometeorological stations, the radar sets, and the Panama City Field station, and

WHEREAS, until the time of his reassignment, Dr. Leipper was a conscientious, capable and dedicated administrator respected by his colleagues and students, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, by the Board of Directors of The Texas A&M University System meeting this 22nd day of February, 1964 at College Station, Texas, that this Board desires to express its appreciation to Dr. Dale F. Leipper for the fine and loyal service he has rendered Texas A&M University as Head of the Department of Oceanography and Meteorology and to wish him well in his reassignment as full-time teacher-researcher, and be it further

Page 11: 34, 36 Home in high school years. The double brick house on Sixth St. The attic was open to both side residents and I used to meet the boy my age to play pool in the common atti They had trouble finding a nickname. Gordon Keyes tried "Eagle beak" but it didn't last. First chores - yard work.

I never knew them. Mother told how her father had to sleep in a chair because of back trouble.

I knew both of Dad's parents. He was a coal miner whose hair had turned white at an early age. He us to sit on his front porch and watch the cars coming down the grade from Salem. He told slightly shady stories over and over. He loved to watch the neighbor girl on her sleigh. He was very proud of a flower patch he developed by his porch. The cockscomb.
