Bartie and I owe a lot to you two and we look back with formness on those years we collaborated together—at UCLA in 1942-1943, the happy news that you and I (plus Crowell, Olson, et al) would be brand-new second lieutenants studying under Sverdrup at Scripps in mid-1943, and the evolutionary year spent in your fledgling Department of Oceanography at Texas A&M in 1952-53. During those years, your babies appeared, as did ours, so it was always fun comparing notes in that regard too.

Anecdotally, the worst three hours ever spent in your company was in April, 1953 after my doctoral committee rejected my dissertation on "Delta Theory" as too long. Fortunately, you and Dr. Armie Price were able to come up with a compromise over the dinner hour which let the "book" be accepted after all. Its vindication, of course, came later that year when the concept won the President's Award of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists, as well as led to my being facetiously called "Delta Bates": Certainly that recognition confirmed that YOUR Department of Oceanography was going to become famed through the Southwest—and it did: Not at all bad for a first try and definitely vindicated in part Dr. Jakkula's faith in you despite Dean Trotter's high coefficient for worrying:
